The trustees present their report and financial statements together with the Independent Examiner's Report for the year ended 31 March 2025.

Objectives and Activities

The charity's purposes are:

- the advancement of education; and
- the advancement of citizenship or community development.

Kirkcaldy District Scout Council's aim is to promote the purpose of Scouting and to actively engage and support young people aged 4 - 25 in their personal development, empowering them to make positive contribution to society. We are organised to provide support to the eight Scout Groups in Scouts Kirkcaldy for administration, leader training, communications, international co-ordination and an Assessment capability to support the adventurous activities of the Movement. It does this in line with the Values of Scouting which are that as Scouts we are guided by these values:

- Integrity we act with integrity; we are honest, trustworthy and loyal
- Respect we have self-respect and respect for others
- Care we support others and take care of the world in which we live
- Belief we explore our faiths, beliefs and attitudes
- Cooperation we make positive difference; we cooperate with others and make friends.

The Scout Council provides oversight, leadership and direction via the Lead Volunteer and the Trustee Board across our 8 Scout Groups, 194 adult volunteers and 644 youth members.

Achievements and Performance

Preparing Better Futures

Our amazing leaders continue to deliver outstanding opportunities to our young people, every week. These opportunities, through delivery of a balanced programme, in turn allow our young people to earn our top awards. Our top awards show our young people have tried new things, been dedicated to learning new skills, developed resilience and determination and built their confidence. They are a really big achievement, and we are extremely proud with the number of top awards that continue to be earned across the District.

- 40 Chief Scout's Bronze Awards to Beaver Scouts (aged 6 to 8)
- 40 Chief Scout's Silver Awards to Cub Scouts (aged 8 to 10½)
- 6 Chief Scout's Gold Awards to Scouts (aged 10½ to 14)

These awards demonstrate the Skills for Life we are supporting our young people to gain and how our leaders are helping them to fulfil their potential. They are underpinned by our commitment to outdoor experiences

Our Explorer Scout provision continues to evolve and now young people from 4th Fife, 6th Fife, 14th Fife, 80th Fife and 115th Fife are meeting together on Wednesday evenings under the banner of Lang Toun Explorer Unit. A number of Explorer Scouts from other Groups are also taking part, mainly because of the great relationships these young people are developing at other events.

In July 2024, our District continued a great tradition of sending Explorer Scouts to the Blair Atholl International Jamboree and 12 Explorer Scouts from 5 Groups – 5^{th} Fife, 6^{th} Fife, 11^{th} Fife, 14^{th} Fife and 80th Fife - rerepresented East Scotland Region at the event. They worked really hard with their training over a number of camps, single-day events and evenings to prepare for this prestigious event. The District Trustee Board also supported their two patrols with the investment of new patrol tents, to ensure they have the right support needed for the event.

In August 2024, we appointed Euan Stewart to the position of District Youth Lead. Youth Leads are volunteers responsible for driving youth shaped Scouts in their local area. Euan's job is to support volunteers in the District helping them to understand the importance of being youth shaped and put it into practice. Since being appointed, he's been working closely with his peers in East Scotland Region and across Scotland and will be bringing this learning to support scouting in the District.

In October 2024, we opened our first of what we plan to be several Squirrel Dreys. Supported by the Local Growth Officer at SHQ, 16 new Squirrel Scouts started their scouting journey on a Wednesday afternoon and have gone from strength to strength, awarding their first Chief Scout Acorn Awards and now with 24 Squirrels in the Drey!

As the Scouting year continues, there are plans to open a new Squirrel Drey at 115th Fife in later summer 2025 and plans are also progressing at 6th Fife, 11th Fife and 14th Fife to open Squirrel Dreys in 2026.

The annual census taken in January 2025 saw a small increase in the numbers of young people and a larger increase in the number of adult volunteers, which is encouraging. Our groups are continuing to recruit new trustees with appropriate skills and this is as important as attracting uniformed leaders, as our Trustees provide essential support to leaders, bring essential expertise to ensure good governance and adherence of the Scout Association rules and legislation.

In 2024, the Scout Association instigated a programme of Transformation to modernise the organisation to improve the volunteer experience and make it more attractive. We've seen a 13% increase in adult volunteers since transformation was launched, and we hope this continues so we have enough adults to support all the local young people who want to join Scouting.

In last years report, we highlighted that the Trustee Board were acting as the Group Trustee Board for 24th Fife and 35th Fife due to lack of volunteers. This was a highlighted concern and would be a particular focus for the Trustee Board moving forward. Unfortunately, the Trustee Board had to take the difficult decision to close two groups this year – 24th Fife and 35th Fife. 24th Fife resumed in 2022 after a closure and after 12 months in a local church hall, returned to their own hall following clear focus by the Trustee Board to support. Both leaders at 24th Fife decided in early 2025 that they wanted to retire and despite recruitment attempts, these vacancies remained unfilled.

At 35th Fife, some bad news about the building condition and high remediation costs, meant that the difficult decision was made to close the hall and the Group. All youth members from both Groups have been transitioned to other local groups and all five adult volunteers from 35th Fife have also transitioned to other local Groups. The Trustee Board are working through the administrative activity to catalogue assets and finalise the closure. Hopefully, at a point in the future, scouting can resume in these areas of the District.

The District Team continue to support across the District, whether that be with the running of District events, providing practical opportunities for our adult volunteers, whether that be advice on governance matters, building relationships with elected representatives, direct or indirect learning opportunities, camps or practical support such as planning a camp where the adult can gain their camping permit to continue to deliver these experiences themselves, in line with the 2025 vision, mission and values of Scouting. As we move forward into 2025/26, and Transformation continues to embed, we are also looking to grow our District Team and hope that our existing adult volunteers will come onboard to support, as well as attracting new adults into scouting.

We encourage all our adult volunteer to take advantage of District events so their young people have access to a wider Scouting experience and share the great things they are doing so we can allow others to learn from these successes and promote our excellent Scouting to a wider audience. The number of Nights Away Permits has been falling with some Groups only having access to a single permit holder. District ran a very successful Nights Away Permit learning event in September 2025 where eight of our adult volunteers attended and are planning a further event before Easter 2026. In the meantime, we hope that Groups will buddy up with others for camps and sleepovers to ensure our young people continue to get access to these vital events and our adult volunteers take advantage of the learning opportunities to help them gain the requisite permits.

Groups and adult volunteers have done particularly well throughout the year by ensuring their learning is up to date, and District are usually clear of overdue learning but we can't be complacent and need to keep on top of our PVG renewals and renew our learning in good time.



Explorer Belt - Netherlands 2024

In brief, it is a ten-day expedition that brings you a real understanding of a different country, its culture and way of life. It is one of the hardest awards in Scouting because you undertake a 10-day expedition as part of a team outside the UK with a minimum travelling time of 50 hours over the 10 days, by foot, cycle, horse, canoe, boat or dinghy and during that time you complete 1 major project and 10 minor projects. In late 2023/early 2024, the planning began in earnest for a planned summer 2024 Explorer Belt to the Netherlands, the first one in the District for many years. Euan Stewart from 86th Fife and Archie Campbell from 6th Fife were joined by Zoe Nimmo from North East Fife and Archie Mitchell from Perth & Kinross. All four were members of the East Region World Scout Jamboree Unit to South Korea in 2023 so had a big advantage of having built good relationships over the previous two years.

The Explorer Belt started in Ijmuiden and took in Haarlem, Rotterdam, Eindhoven, Arnhem, Ede, Amersfoort, Utrecht, Amsterdam before rejoining the ferry in Ijmuiden. Over 600km cycled, major bike repairs, "the Netherlands are flat....", but they worked very hard in sometimes tough conditions and definitely earned their stoofpotje (beef stew) from the Theehuis Rhijnauwen in Bunnik. Euan enjoyed it so much that he is part of the leadership team for the next planned Explorer Belt to Germany in 2027.

Wemyss Firs Scout Campsite

Our campsite at Wemyss Firs continues to attract Groups from our own District and others from across the UK as a venue for skills-based camps. Throughout peak camping season, we've experienced a full-to-capacity weekend calendar plus some mid-week bookings, including two Summer Camps this year with groups from Aberdeen and Huddersfield. We've enabled groups to offer 2,074 Nights Away to young people over the last twelve months.

We continue to operate the campsite with an effective budget in place to keep our booking fees minimal. Our focus has always been adventure as we know that keeping our fees low enables Groups to invest in providing even better experiences for young people. Our statistics show that the average price is £1.58 per person per night with some Kirkcaldy Groups camping for as little as £1.02, which at a time when the cost of everything is going up, we're proud that this is lower than last year.

We've renewed our lease for another ten years so we're excited to be able to re-start investment and improvements in the coming year – watch this space! We continue to be grateful to the Wemyss family and Savills for everything they do to support us and they're always delighted to hear about how Wemyss Firs benefits so many young people.

As we head into our 40th year as the Kirkcaldy District Campsite, we're planning some celebrations throughout 2026, we'll share more on our social media channels soon!







Financial Review

Overview

The accounts show a surplus of £36,388 due to monies collected in advance for summer 2025 Canada trip.

The Melville Fund was set up in memory of a former Scouter "to support someone (or more than one person) within the District who needs financial help towards a trip or activity that they cannot fully fund themselves". This valuable fund has been sadly underused and District welcomes applications to provide financial support to those who may not otherwise be able to attend a scouting event for lack of money.

Reserves Policy

The trustees' policy is to maintain reserves at around 3 months of normal running costs in order to meet commitments and cover any unexpected expenditure.

Future Plans

The District maintains and regularly reviews its strategic plan which directly supports our Groups, promotes good practice & governance and is a road map to both sustaining and growing Scouting across the District. With transformation well underway, we have been working on some plans to grow our District Team to support our young people and adult volunteers more effectively. The team has been running with a very small number for some time now, with some vacant roles but during 2025/26 session, we hope to change the shape of how we are organised with more volunteers.

At the 2024 AGM, we shared that the District are currently exploring the viability of taking on Linktown Church as a community amenity. The intention was to create a space for local Scout Groups to meet but also develop the facilities for greater use by both Scouting and the local community. The District Trustee Board spent considerable time and energy meeting local representatives for support with the plan but in the end, decided that the Linktown project, and the maintenance costs associated with a church building of this size was too great a risk for the District to progress. However, we are looking at alternative options for local Scout Groups to meet, including Abbotshall Church Hall and also developing the former 24th Fife Hall in Dunearn Drive as an asset for scouting use as well as a community facility that will bring in income that can be reinvested into scouting locally.

International activities continue to be a regular feature across the District and these connections and friendships are supporting our young people in their personal development and fulfilment. They are appreciating commonalities and differences, expanding their perspectives, developing new skills, and enjoying unique travel experiences that they might otherwise not be able to enjoy.

International activities planned:

- In 2026, we will send 2 patrols of 12 Explorer Scouts to the Blair Atholl International Jamborette
- In 2026, a team made up of Scouts, Explorers, Network and adult volunteers from across the District will head to camp with 30,000 Scouts in Hedeland Nature Park for the Danish National Jamboree – Spejdernes Lejr.
- In summer 2027, the 26th World Scout Jamboree will take place in Poland and two Scouts from the District will represent us at this prestigious event
- In 2027, we will be taking up to 28 Explorers and Network to Germany where they will undertake the ultimate scouting challenge, their Explorer belt.

Structure Governance and Management

Governing Document

The District is an unincorporated registered Scottish Charity, governed by the terms detailed in the constitution of The Scout Association (incorporated by Royal Charter in 1912) and as detailed in its Policy, Organisation and Rules ("POR"), as amended by its Scottish Variations.

Organisational Structure

Kirkcaldy District Scout Council is the body to which the Trustee Board is accountable. The Council normally meets once per year. The Trustee Board is responsible for the day-to-day management of the District's affairs and normally meets five times per year. Responsibility for delivery of the Scout Programme is delegated to the District Leadership Team under the leadership of the Lead Volunteer. Responsibility for the management of the Wemyss Firs Scout Campsite is delegated to the Campsite, who operates under agreed delegated authority and reports to the Trustee Board.

Appointment of Trustees

New trustees are recruited in accordance with POR as and when required.

Any newly appointed trustees are advised of the objectives and activities of the District, and are to act in accordance with POR in force at the date of appointment and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. New trustees carry out learning and validation in six modules of the Scout Association's National Learning Scheme:

- Who We Are and What We Do
- Being a Trustee in Scouts
- Data Protection in Scouts
- Safety
- Safeguarding
- Creating Inclusion

Independent Examiner's Report for the year ended 31st March 2025

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Kirkcaldy District Scout Council.

I report on the Accounts of the Charity for the year ended 31st March 2025 as set out on pages 16 to 21.

Respective Responsibilities of the Trustees and Examiner

The Charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 ("the 2005 Act") and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) ("the 2006 Regulations").
